With each of our summer offerings, students will be diving into Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Mathematics (STEAM) while also exploring Native Hawaiian resiliency and 'āina connectivity. In true Nā Pua No'eau fashion, each of our class offerings listed below will diving deeply into their focused subject area through hands-on activities and field exploration while also being grounded in Native Hawaiian language and culture.

APPLICATION PROCESS

Keeping in mind that we will only be accepting 50 students per session, we are **really** looking for students who:

-Are eager and committed to participating at our summer residential program 100%. Students must participate at our summer program in its entirety. Because of the limited student offerings and the costs involved, participants may not under any circumstances (unless there is a dire family emergency) leave our program once it begins.

-There are two sections to our application: one, for the parent(s)/guardian(s) to complete and the other for the student to complete.

For the first part of our application, parents/guardians, **please take your time**, and answer the questions asked of you as accurately as possible.

For the second part of our application, students, please **answer the questions as completely as possible**. We are not necessarily looking for the smartest and brightest students, but we are looking for those student with high motivation and potential. When you answer any given question, please give it some thought and provide us with as much details as you possibly can. It is difficult for us to determine your personal motivation with one word or short answers.

-If selected, you may not be necessarily selected for your 1st choice class you apply for. Please keep this in mind as you select your 1st, 2nd and 3rd choice classes for our summer program.

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KEEPING EVERYONE SAFE

Nā Pua No'eau UH Mānoa with support from our Native Hawaiian Student Services director and our Hawai'i inuiākea- School of Hawaiian Knowledge have put together a plan of action to keep both our students and staff safe during our summer residential program. Below are some of the general safety highlights we will be following:

- Maximum Number of Student Participants:** This summer we will be offering 50 student slots per session with an average of 1 adult (kumu, kumu kōkua, residential, etc.) for every 10 students. In doing so, we will have the capacity to monitor, transport and teach our students as safely as possible.
- Staff and Student Testing Protocol:** In accordance to the State's current removal of the COVID-19 State of Emergency order, students and staff **are not** required to have proof of vaccinations. However, again to keep everyone safe during our summer residential program, all students and staff will be given temperature checks as needed and may need to complete and clear the "at-home" version of the COVID-19 at home testing kit. (*Kits will be provided by Nā Pua No'eau UH Mānoa free of charge.)
- Other Details on Our Safety Measures:** Other pertinent safety measures and details regarding our summer program will be shared at our **MANDATORY online student AND 'ohana orientation on Thursday, May 16, 2024, 6-8pm.**

HOW MUCH DOES IT COST?

Much mahalo to all of our collaborators, Summer Institute is provided to all students FREE OF CHARGE. Costs including, meals, supplies, housing, staffing, transportation, travel (including interisland airfare for those students flying in from our neighbor islands) are paid for via various funding sources. A \$100 refundable deposit is required upon being accepted into our program. The full \$100 deposit will be returned if: students participate in our program in its entirety and if there are no damages or missing items (towels, sheets, etc. from housing) during our program. ***Full or partial deposit waivers may be available to 'ohana on a case by case basis.** Other detailed information on what students will need to pack/bring with them will be provided at our mandatory online student and 'ohana orientation.

All students accepted into our summer program along with their parent(s)/guardian(s) must attend our **MANDATORY online student AND 'ohana orientation on Thursday, May 16, 2024, 6-8pm.** Our mandatory 'ohana session will be held online via ZOOM.
